Beginners' Class

The Club holds a Beginners' Class alongside the puppy classes (2.00 pm on Sunday afternoons) for dogs 6 months of age and over. They are registered on the first Sunday of the month (not weekly like puppies) and it is in the best interests of handlers and dogs to spend at least four consecutive weeks training before progressing to Class 1.

Older dogs are taught the same basic commands as puppies. As owners may not know much of the background of say, a dog adopted from a rescue centre, it is advisable that a few weeks are spent 'bonding' with their dog prior to training at the club. Forget the saying - 'you can't teach an old dog new tricks,' - Oh yes you can! It might take longer, that's all. With patience, short sessions at home, rewarding with a tasty treat and verbal praise you will make progress. What can be more satisfying than a well-mannered dog completely focused on its owner, an alert dog happily walking by its owner's side and a dog eagerly returning to the handler on recall? It is a two-way relationship and all about learning from each other. Training should be fun for both of you - you are your own best critic on whether you have shown your dog what you would like him/her to do and given praise instantly your dog has got it right.

Beginners don't join in the warm up before class - they may be nervous and overwhelmed by the number of people and puppies milling around, so an important part of training is to introduce dogs gradually to different situations. Walking along a main road, through a bus station, past a school at playtime and other situations that fit in with their family life will play an important part in building up a dog's confidence. In class, socialisation with other dogs will be practised. Play with toys at home is encouraged but not included in the Beginners' Class as the dogs have enough to cope without becoming over-excited about another dog's toy. You can bet this will happen someone else's toy becomes more appealing than their own! However in Class 1 dogs will have the opportunity to expand their skills through play.

The Club would like you and your dog to benefit from the Beginners' Class but please try not to compare your progress with others - just concentrate on your own dog as you have a unique partnership. There will be good days and not such good days! Our canine companions have their off days just like us. If you have more than one dog, try to give each some individual attention.

Please do not hesitate to talk to us if you have any concerns about your dog - we will help you all we can.
